DIRECTOR'S NOTES

When the undergraduate theatre students presented D.W. Gregory's play *Radium Girls* at the 2023-2024 season selection meeting, I sat forward in my seat. I knew the story—a group of young women who, in the early twentieth century, developed radium poisoning by painting luminous watch dials at their workplaces. I also knew that the plight and legal action of these women had helped to reform occupational labor law and shape some of the rights of modern workers. The play's focus on justice and workplace safety resonated for me, but I was also impressed that our extraordinary MU Theatre majors wished to stage a play of such historical significance. I took up the students' call and agreed to direct our production.

Directing plays that represent history onstage requires engaging with past, present, and future realities. Most of the characters you meet in our production—Grace Fryer, Arthur Roeder, Charlie Lee-were real people whose legacies (and families) are forever marked by their encounters with radium. Historically, these people were from a range of ethnic backgrounds, which today are all generally read as "white." Our production of Radium Girls, however, joins present efforts-across theatre, television, and film-to tell historical narratives while representing the breadth of US society. As such, our production invites you to notice how a particular US history is complicated and expanded when the story of the "radium girls" is performed by the diversity of the MU student body. In so doing, we hope this production presses you to consider how the legal action undertaken by a brave group of young women nearly one hundred years ago continues to protect people in contemporary labor struggles today and tomorrow. My thanks to MU Theatre majors for drawing me into this important story.

DRAMATURGS' NOTE

The following incorporates real headlines and quotes from 1920s newspapers:

POISONED! - AS THEY CHATTED MERRILY AT WORK

Radium Girl(s) Await Death at Orange, New Jersey

What would you do if you had been told...that you only had one year to live? Five young women of New Jersey are living their answers to that...question.

Easy work and...good pay brought about one hundred and fifty women to the factory of the United States Radium Corporation in Orange, New Jersey. There, they were instructed on how to use radium to finely paint the glow-inthe-dark details of watch faces.. As of 1926, 7 young women who worked in that factory were already in their graves, at least 3 more were sure to die in a few months. These women were the victims of radium poisoning and sued the United States Radium Corporation. Once the material lodges itself in the human body, science knows no way to get the restless little radium out. The patient begins to be pale, weak, and as the bones and tissues decay, very painful abscesses develop and death finally ends a long period of helpless suffering. The radium plant denied that it was in any way responsible for the deaths... of their employees. Nobody knew that the hand of death punched the time clock for those [in] the radium watch factory.

When asked about her cruel fate,...Grace Fryer (27) remarked, "I'm not utterly discouraged. I've seen others grow ill, have watched them die. But I'm still alive and hoping. Who knows? Some doctor may find a remedy yet."

That is to say, there is a bright side; these discoveries, illuminated by the dark case of radium girls like Grace Fryer, are of the utmost value... in medicine.

Last year more than 1,500 productions were entered in the KCACTF involving more than 200,000 students nationwide. By entering this production, our theater department is sharing in the KCACTF goals to recognize, reward, and celebrate the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.
