

Our department carries on their legacy as artist-scholars in the productions and publications we produce today.

Dr. Archer was a Professor in the Theatre Department at the University of Missouri for 27 years. In addition to teaching, directing plays & guiding dissertations, Stephen was an author of seven books, including textbooks, reference books, a biography of Junius Brutus Booth and a personal memoir, "I, Clodhopper".

Dr. Waal Johns was a Professor at the University of Missouri-Columbia from 1973-1992, where she was Chairperson of the Department of Speech and Dramatic Art from 1982-85. She co-authored the anthology Hardship and Hope: Missouri Women Writing about Their Lives and performed its stories in a two-woman show. She wrote and translated several other books, including a biography about Harriet Bosse.

Director's Note

ust by the sheer mention of the word fairy tale and I'm Jimmediately transformed back into that little kid in my room playing with my toys. I remember vividly playing with my toys. Me, my imagination, and those toys would go on so many epic adventures, whether it was my Ninja Turtles or my Transformers or the little GI Joe men and of course my favorites the dinosaurs. During that playtime I could be anywhere, a beach by the ocean, a volcano, or with giants in the sky. During those moments as a little kid, you could not tell me that everything wasn't going to be OK, regardless of what was going on outside of my room. Sometimes as an adult I forget those moments and I need fairy tales to remind me to smile, breathe, and remember that everything can be ok. Working on Jacked! this Summer has given me so many reasons to smile and be full of hope. The opportunity to create with this talented collection of actors, designers, production staff and most importantly wonderful people has been its own fairy tale. Jacked! is a story that we want everyone to be able to see themselves in, from our youngest audience member to our oldest audience member. We wanted to create something that's never been done before. We did not want to just create a performance that we do for the audience, but an opportunity for us all to share in the story. In a conversation with our Dramaturg the question "What makes our community garden grow?" came about. This question stuck, there is so much meaning in this short question. Dramaturg's Note

rince the very first "once upon a time", folk tales, fairy tales, and fables have been used to teach lessons, provide cautions, and entertain generations. But, what if a fairy tale could do more? This is exactly the question Jacked! author Idris Goodwin asks of a classic: Jack and the Beanstalk. In this continuation. Goodwin offers an answer to the age-old question what happens after "happily ever after", as Jack and his community are left with the consequences of a new source of "magic". This short play for young audiences offers a safe and playful space to have difficult conversations surrounding the opioid epidemic in America. Goodwin sites an NPR podcast discussing the strain of this epidemic on the foster care system as the impetus of his work. Goodwin was deeply moved after learning that the children impacted by the epidemic believed that they were the ones to blame for their situation. With that in mind, Goodwin put pen to paper, and the result is one for the history books, or perhaps the storybooks.

This play, while energetic, witty, and fun, does not shy away from the tough reality that many communities, families, and children face across the country. It points a finger at the institutions that have failed, nods to systems that have broken, and honestly asks children ages one to one hundred what we can do to nourish, support, and re-grow communities left barren by the opioid crisis. Before we jump into our tale, I offer a word of advice: do not write this fable off as just another nursery rhyme. Enter the world of the play with fresh eyes and an open mind, much like the children that this show was written for. You may be surprised by what you learn and how much fun you have along the way
